Jim Rees brought the meeting to order at 7:35am.

Agenda Preview

There were no changes to the agenda as presented.

Announcements

Karen Palus:

- Karen expressed her appreciation to the Committee for their support of the SCIP bond measure through letters, emails, calls, etc. City Council voted not to put the measure on the ballot. Dialogue with mayoral and council candidates concerning future Parks funding is ongoing.
- The RFP has been released for the Pikes Peak America's Mountain Summit House. Karen thanked John Maynard, Ron Ilgen (Parks and Recreation Advisory Board member) and the Pikes Peak Advocates for their ongoing support and participation in the process.

Chris Lieber:

- Chris mentioned discussions of another long-term project, the Ring the Peak trail, are continuing and that the trail had been mentioned by Governor Hickenlooper during a recent visit to Colorado Springs. Though extensive portions of the trail are outside the city limits, it is part of the new master plan.

Approval of Minutes

Motion – to approve the minutes of the January 7, 2015 meeting.

- Lee Milner/Jason Alwine Approved – Unanimous

Citizen Discussion

Bill Koerner (TOSC):

- Expressed the TOSC board's disappointment with Council's vote not to place the SCIP measure on the ballot and reiterated that TOSC is committed to continued support and to finding sustainable funding for parks.
- Suggested vigilance regarding the possibility that TOPS could be considered a sustainable funding source outside of its intended uses. A brief discussion included the idea that all parks/trails/open space stakeholders should have a common strategy.

- TOSC is planning a candidate forum where candidates will be asked about their solutions for parks funding and views on issues important to TOSC.
- In response to a question Karen stated that Council members voted against putting the SCIP measure on the ballot for a variety of reasons including storm water issues, concern about debt, and worry about a possible lawsuit by Pueblo.

Presentation Items

Ute Valley Master Plan (Sarah Bryarly, Priscilla Marbaker, Susan Watkins, Tweed Kezziah)

- Chris Lieber announced that the City closed on the purchase of the HP Phase II property on Friday, January 30. The 110 acres were purchased for \$2.8 million from the Trust for Public Land, who had bought and held it for the City. Chris also thanked and congratulated additional partners who contributed to the purchase including the Friends of Ute Valley Park (FUVVP) who engaged in fundraising efforts, GOCO who provided two grants, Lyda Hill who set up a challenge grant, TOSC for their support, and the TOPS Working Committee members who have been on board during the process.
- Dan Woods (FUVVP) invited Committee members to a celebration of the purchase on Feb. 18, 7:00pm at Red Lake Brewery.
- Chris explained that although it is the responsibility of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board to approve the master plan, it is important for the Committee to review the plan, keeping in mind the purpose of open space as described in the TOPS ordinance:
 - linkages and trails, access to public lakes, streams, and other suitable open space lands, stream corridors and scenic corridors along existing highways;
 - preservation of fragile ecosystems, natural areas, scenic vistas and areas, fish and wildlife habitats and corridors, or important areas that support biodiversity, natural resources, significant land formations and landmarks, and cultural, historical and archeological areas;
 - creating spatial definition of and between urban areas;
 - areas of environmental preservation, designated as areas of concern, generally in multiple ownership, where several different preservation methods (including other governmental bodies' participation or private ownership) may need to be used;
 - conservation of natural and visual resources, including but not limited to forest lands, range lands, agricultural land, aquifer recharge areas, and surface water;
 - lands within or adjacent to a park or public open lands whose development potential is clearly incompatible with those lands;
 - preservation of land for educational opportunities and outdoor recreation areas limited to passive recreational use, including but not limited to hiking, photography or nature studies, and if specifically designated, bicycling, horseback riding, or fishing
- Sarah Bryarly, Priscilla Marbaker (Tapis Associates), Susan Watkins, and Tweed Kezziah (Kezziah Watkins) presented the Ute Valley Master Plan. (See presentation at the end of minutes.)
 - Sarah detailed the approval process, which includes a presentation to the PRAB on February 12, with a vote on March 12 to accept or reject the plan. TOPS WC input will be communicated to the PRAB.

- Susan recapped the public process which was followed in creating the plan.
- Priscilla spoke about the content of the plan.
- Committee comments and discussion included these issues:
 - Forest restoration/fire mitigation
 - Trails for walking with off-leash dogs and/or dog parks (Chris recommended this be discussed later as part of a system-wide rather than UVP-specific discussion)
 - Signage
 - Methods to eliminate muddiness which leads to trail widening
 - General interpretive signage regarding the archeological/paleontological past of the land
 - Notation of TOPS-funded land on maps
 - Tier 3 vs other types of trails
 - Parking
- Sarah thanked Steve Schneider (archeologist), Sharon Milito (paleontologist), and Tess Kelso who documented the vegetation with Colorado College students for their contributions to the plan.
- Public comments included these issues:
 - FUVVP board members Dan Wood and Frank stated their support of the process and the final plan, thanked all those involved, and predicted the efforts will be appreciated in the future
 - Dave Ward (FUVVP Treasurer but speaking as a citizen) also spoke in favor of providing for off-leash dogs in some way
 - Rogue trails

Ethics Training (Britt Haley)

- Britt provided the required annual ethics training and answered questions. (See presentation at the end of minutes.)

2015 CIP Report (Chris Lieber)

- Chris presented a brief overview of some of the projects which will be coming up in 2015 (See presentation at the end of minutes.)

Staff Reports (Chris Lieber)

- Legacy Loop:
 - A second application will be submitted to GOCO for a \$1 million grant
 - A community forum will be held in late February
- Venezia Community Park:
 - RFQ's will be received on February 6 from which a short list for competitive bids will be developed; significant amount of interest from contracting community

Citizen Discussion

There was no citizen discussion.

Adjournment

Motion – To adjourn the meeting as no Closed Executive Session was needed.

Givens Set Parameters


- **The City's Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department is legally responsible for design, maintenance, operations and management of all resources for Ute Valley Park.**
- **The newly-acquired portion of the Park is subject to the requirements and restrictions of the Trails, Open Space and Parks (TOPS) Ordinance. All elements of the Master and Management Plan must conform to the Colorado Springs Parks Rules and Regulations Ordinances.**
- **The planning process will respect the terms and conditions of existing utility easements, sign easements, and the conservation easement. The conservation easement currently applies only to the portions acquired through the TOPS program.**
- **In accordance with the Plat and Development Plan, the City is responsible for road improvements along Ute Valley Road, including construction of a round-about southwest of Rockrimmon Boulevard.**
- **There will be a new Ute Valley trail which will connect to the regional trail system in accordance with the 2010 and 2014 Parks, Trails and Open Space Master Plan.**
- **Implementation of the Master Plan will occur as funding allows.**
- **Many groups and individuals are interested in and encouraged to help develop the best possible Master and Management Plan; all voices will be equal in the decision-making process.**
- **The recommended Master and Management Plan will be submitted to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board for approval.**

1.3.102: DEFINITIONS:

COVERED PERSONS:

Elected officials, **appointees**, administrative officers, employees, independent contractors and volunteers in connection with their work for the City.

APPOINTEES:

Are "administrative officers" and shall mean and include all persons appointed by the Mayor and/or members of City Council pursuant to the City Charter and this City Code, to include the City Attorney, City Auditor, City Clerk, Municipal Court Judges and Utilities Chief Executive Officer **and all members of boards, committees and commissions appointed by the Mayor and/or City Council.** For purposes of this Code, the term "appointee" shall also include the Memorial Health System Chief Executive Officer.

Gifts and Conflicts of Interest

- **Gift:** A payment, subscription, advance, forbearance, acceptance, rendering or deposit of money, services, or anything of value given, to include food, lodging, transportation, golf or other recreation or entertainment, and reimbursement for other than necessary expenses for official business on behalf of the City, unless consideration of equal or greater value is received.
- **Conflict of Interest:** Every covered person owes a duty of loyalty to the City. A conflict of interest exists when there is any personal or financial relationship that could influence or be perceived to influence the representation or conduct of business for, or on behalf of, the City. A conflict of interest also exists when any improper and undue influence can be exercised, or be perceived to be exercised, concerning a direct action involving the City. A conflict of interest may exist when there is an appearance of impropriety.

1.3.104 Hospitality and Gifts

- No covered person shall solicit for, accept or give any gift or thing of value related solely to the covered person's duties and responsibilities on behalf of the City.
- Providing that the gift could not be considered a bribe...the following items are exceptions:
 - Campaign contributions
 - Items valued under \$50.00 per year from a vendor or third party
 - Unsolicited awards or token of appreciation-such as plaques & professional awards.
 - Perishable or consumable gifts given to a City Department or Group.

What is inappropriate?

- Inappropriate hospitality or gifts involves offering or receiving accommodations, tours, event tickets, recreation, entertainment, meals or other similar personal benefits when a personal or financial relationship exists that could influence **or be perceived to influence objectivity** when interacting with, representing, or conducting business for or on behalf of the City. (City Code 1.3.104)

Conflicts of Interest



"So, I'm the only one who sees a conflict of interest here?"

Conflicts of Interest

Every covered person owes a duty of loyalty to the City. A conflict of interest exists when there is any personal or financial relationship that **could influence or be perceived to influence** the representation or conduct of business for, or on behalf of, the City.

A conflict of interest also exists when any improper and undue influence can be exercised, or be perceived to be exercised, concerning a direct action involving the City. A conflict of interest may exist when there is an appearance of impropriety. No conflict of interest is allowed.

City Code 1.6.106

Rule of thumb: If your participation in an official action could result in a direct or indirect financial or other benefit to you, your business, or your family members..you have a conflict of interest.

Enforcement

Complaints; Inquiries:

Any person may file a written complaint or an inquiry for consideration by the Independent Ethics Commission through the City Attorney regarding a matter involving an elected official, an appointee including members of boards, committees and commissions appointed by City Council, the President of Council or the Mayor, or an independent contractor.

Any written complaint or inquiry shall be filed confidentially and processed in accord with the Independent Ethics Commission Rules of Procedure. The written complaint or inquiry may only be considered for matters occurring within the last twelve (12) months.

1.3.103: Independent Ethics Commission

Frivolous Complaints; Inquiries:

The Independent Ethics Commission may dismiss frivolous complaints or inquiries without further action. A record of dismissal as deemed frivolous shall be maintained as confidential by the Independent Ethics Commission.

Nonfrivolous, Formal Complaints; Inquiries:

The Independent Ethics Commission shall take such steps as necessary pursuant to its rules to investigate nonfrivolous, formal complaints. Within ten (10) days of the conclusion of its investigation and deliberations, the Commission shall issue a confidential written recommendation to City Council containing findings of fact and conclusions of law.

Penalty 1.3.103

Penalty:

Any individual who is found to have breached the public trust and has been found to have done so for private gain, and any person or entity inducing such breach, shall be liable to the City for double the amount of financial equivalent of any benefits obtained by such actions. The manner of recovery and any additional penalties may be as provided by law.

Final Action:

Any decision of the City Council made upon confidential written recommendation of the Independent Ethics Commission may be deemed to be a final action, subject to any appeal to a court with proper jurisdiction. (Ord. 11-18)

Final examples

- People v. Layton 9/25/13 Layton hired a client whom she had represented in several legal matters to clean her house and to work on her political campaign. Layton planned to offset the money she owed her client for that work against the legal fees her client owed her.
- Layton also posted bond for the client and paid the client's rent and vehicle impound fees.
- Finally, Layton provided the client legal advice by filing the client's income taxes; she did so with the expectation that the client's tax refund would be applied to amounts the client owed her for posting bond.
- Layton's personal interest in obtaining the tax refund created a significant risk that this interest would materially influence her tax and general legal advice.

Final scenario

- Also, from the attorney discipline pages...On November 13, 2013, Stuart Adam Jay made a threatening phone call to an Arizona Charles Schwab office because he was locked out of his wife's 401k account and wanted access. In the call, he made threats against the Denver Charles Schwab office, stating that if he did not gain access to his wife's account, innocent people at the Denver office would be "hurt" and the office would be "gone."
- The Denver police dispatched two officers to Jay's residence. Jay answered the door holding a two-foot long antique bayonet. The officers drew their firearms and asked Jay to drop the sword.
- Jay complied and was taken to jail. His penalty.. suspended for 6 months from the practice of law.

Most ethics situations are not so clear cut

- Feel free to call if you have any questions or specific situations.
- Prevention is the best medicine.
- We represent the City—so a person who is subject to a complaint may not be represented by the City Attorney's Office.
